
### Pride Booklist June 2022

All titles on this list are available in the Waterbury Public Library catalog.





# Dykes to Watch Out For by Alison Bechdel





#### The Henna Wars by Adiba Jaigirdar

# Gender Queer by Maia Kobabe







### In The Dream House by Carmen Maria Machado





# She Who Became the Sun by Shelley Parker-Chan
