
No Pressure Book Group Suggestion List- January 2022



The Mountains Wild by Sarah Stewart Taylor

The first in a newer mystery series featuring Irish-American Long Island detective Maggie D'arcy, that will keep you guessing to the very last page. Readers with an interest in Irish or Long Island locales will find lots of familiar sites in these pages. The author now lives in Vermont. This and the second book in the series, <u>A Distant Grave</u>, are both available at the library.



The Memoirs of Stockholm Sven by Nathaniel Ian Miller

Another Vermont author! This story of a disfigured man seeking a solitary life in the Arctic is a perfect winter read of survival and humanity. Our reader assures us the depictions of Norwegian men and food are spot on.




<u>Noise: A Flaw in Human Judgment</u> by Daniel Kahneman, Olivier Sibony and Cass R. Sunstein

An exploration of the variable factors that lead to dramatically different (and frequently bad) judgments by different individuals. This book draws on research in psychology and behavioral economics to explore why people are so impacted by noise and what can be done about it.




Surfing Uncertainty: Prediction, Action and the Embodied Mind by Andy Clark

An examination of how the brain works, why humans dream and create, and what it all means. Written by a philosopher and cognitive scientist, this book explores the way the human mind functions as a prediction machine, constantly processing and making choices based on sensory stimulation from the outside.




Harlem Shuffle by Colson Whitehead

Furniture store owner and family man Carney navigates a criminal underworld that he can't ever quite break away from in late 1950 and early 1960s Harlem. Set against a backdrop of racial tension and a rapidly shifting social landscape, Whitehead brings us into a world of deeply drawn and complex characters getting by however they can.



The Lincoln Highway by Amor Towles

The latest from the author of <u>A Gentleman in Moscow</u>, this time the setting is 1950s Nebraska, where an 18-year-old recently released from a work farm sets off on a mission to track down his brother, but two escapees from the work farm have different plans.




The Book of Life by Deborah Harkness

The third and final title in the All Souls series which started with <u>A Discovery of</u> <u>Witches</u>, and is now a series on Sundance. This book wraps up the trilogy following the adventures of witch historian Diana Bishop and her vampire scientist husband as they search for a legendary alchemical work. While the characters are supernatural beings, the story is surprisingly grounded and you may accidentally take in some real medieval history while being entertained.
