2016: El Deafo by Cece Bell


# 2012: Smile by Raina Telgemeier

A coming-of-age graphic memoir about life in middle school...and dealing with dental drama.




# 2011: 11 Birthdays by Wendy Mass

A powerful story about how not fitting in just might lead to an incredible life....




2003: Love that Dog by Sharon Creech

A short, sweet book of simple poems written by a kid who hates poetry...but loves his yellow dog.




2002: Because of Winn Dixie by Kate DiCamillo
