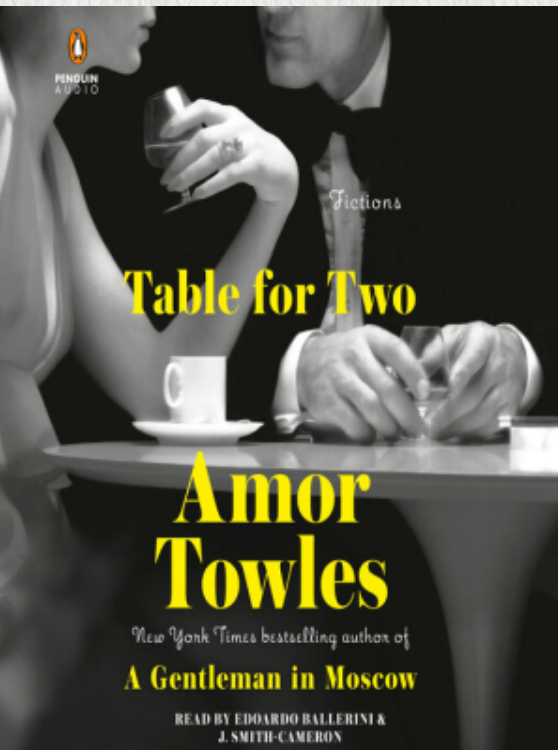
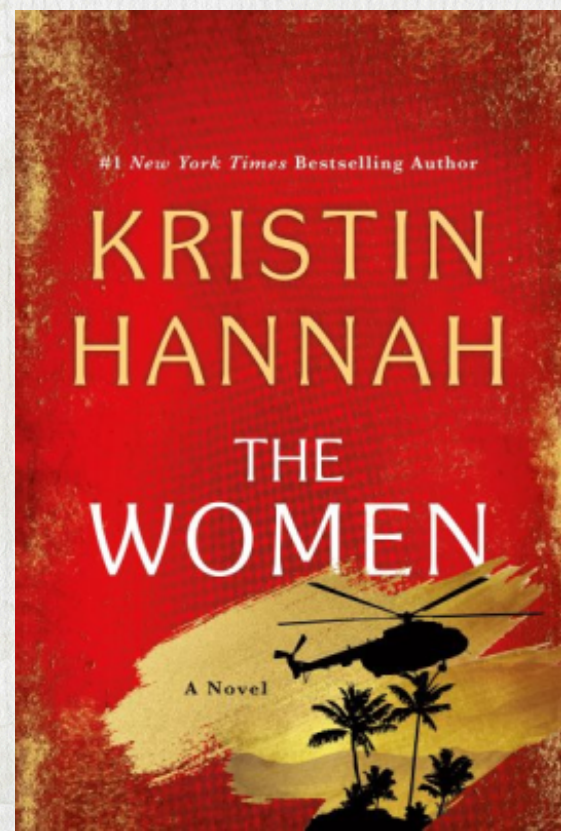


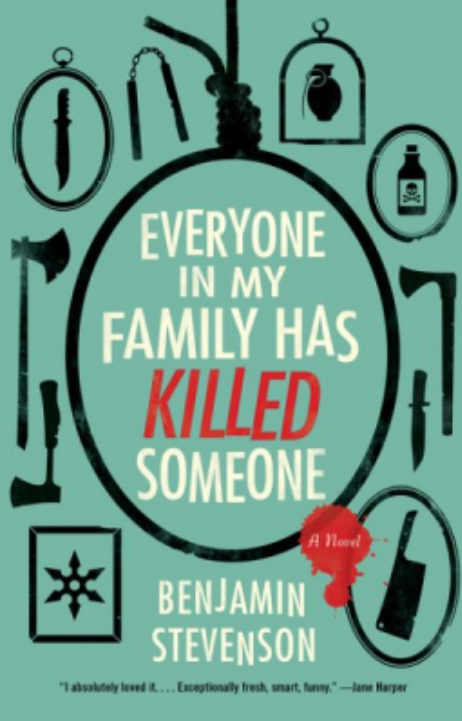
Table for Two by Amor Towles

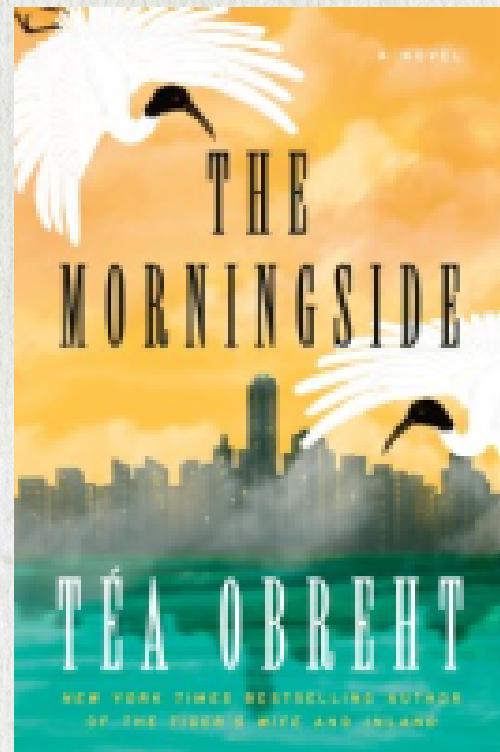


Everyone in My Family Has Killed Someone by Benjamin Stevenson

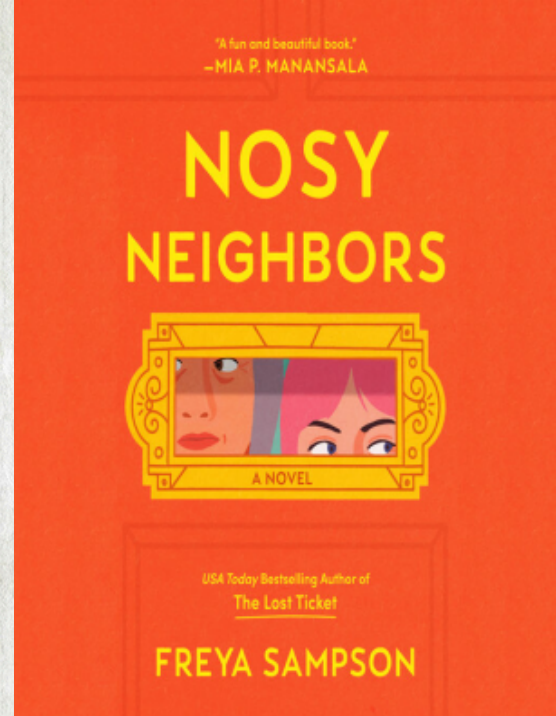


A Girl Called Samson by Amy Harmon

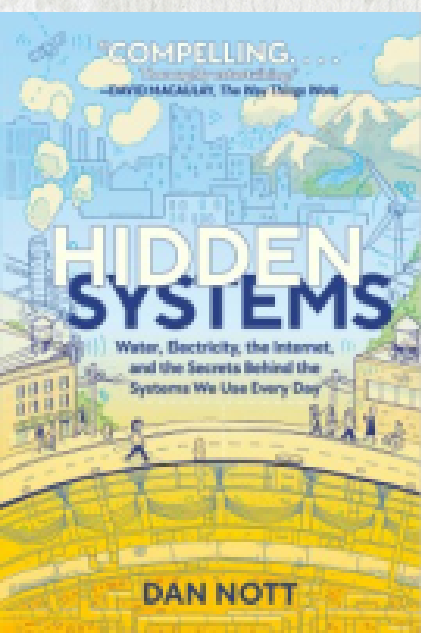
Nosy Neighbors by Freya Sampson
