
<u>No Pressure Book Group Book List</u> <u>March 2025</u>

The Waterbury Public Library's No Pressure Book Group usually meets on the 2nd Thursday of the month at 7:00 on Zoom. See the library website for more information!




Fagin the Thief by Allison Epstein




Witchcraft for Wayward Girls by Grady Hendrix






Tom Lake by Ann Patchett

<u>The Women of Chateau Lafayette</u> by Stephanie Dray


Many women graced the hall of the elegant castle throughout the years. Spanning the 18th century construction of the castle through Nazi occupation, women fight, survive and grow within its walls.

What a Greenland Ice Core Reveals About Earth's Tumultuous History and Perilous Future





When the Ice is Gone by Paul Bierman




<u>The One-in-a-Million Boy</u> by Monica Wood
